From the Chair of the AGCO Agriculture Foundation.

Dear Friends of the Foundation,

In a changing global landscape, our ability to sustain AGCO's philanthropic activities continues to hinge on strategic collaborations and the supportive engagement of our stakeholders. Throughout 2024, we continued to build partnerships with organisations worldwide to advance agricultural innovation and education, enhance farm sustainability and help those in our society facing difficult challenges.

Last year, we wanted to ensure our values, goals and funding programs translated to meaningful impact on the ground for farmers and our communities. We established a matching gift platform with the Future Farmers of America to support agriculture education and the future leaders in farming. We launched mental health initiatives with organisations in Australia, U.S.A and Canada to make mental health support available to farmers. In Brazil, we partnered with The Nature Conservancy to promote sustainable agricultural practices, build the capacity and capability of farmers and train field technicians and university graduates. We also supported FareShare in the U.K. to assist in its work reducing hunger and food waste.

In recent years, we have witnessed increasing demands for crisis relief efforts. And 2024 was no different; we continued our humanitarian relief supports for farmers and communities impacted by climate-related events such as Hurricane Helene in Georgia, U.S.A and the extreme rainfall-induced flooding during April and May in Rio Grande do Sul, Brazil.

There are many other good news stories from the AGCO Agriculture Foundation, which you can explore in this report. We are constantly thinking about how and when we can make a worthwhile difference for our employees, dealers and farming communities. Since its establishment in 2018, the Foundation has funded 37 different projects and programs spanning 16 countries while benefitting over 54,000 people directly and over 300,000 people indirectly.

I am proud of the progress made by the Foundation in a short space of time. Possessing the mandate to allocate funding is a job we take very seriously. We are excited to build on our momentum, aiming to make an even greater difference in many people's lives and strengthen community resilience over the next 12 months.



Supporting climate resilience and sustainable food systems

Achieving food security; tackling food waste

In the UK, our partnership with FareShare Surplus with Purpose program has significantly boosted the charity's efforts to transform food waste into a social good. Over the past two years, we have helped FareShare rescue thousands of tons of surplus food and distribute it to a wide-ranging network of front-line charities, schools and community groups addressing hunger, hardship and their root causes.

Together, we have strengthened FareShare's capacity to rescue more fresh fruit and vegetables directly from farms and growers, ensuring these highly nutritional foods reach individuals and families on low or no income, schoolchildren, older adults, refugees, and those recovering from homelessness, addiction, domestic abuse and trauma.



Supporting climate resilience and sustainable food systems

Promoting sustainable dairy practices among smallholder farmers

In 2023, we funded Heifer Netherlands for two years to launch the Climate-Smart Dairy Farming Project in Nepal. This initiative aims to reduce livestock methane emissions through feeding manipulation and carbon-neutral dairy farming. The project seeks to develop and promote a climate-smart model dairy village, testing, documenting, and disseminating best practices.

Supporting 100 smallholder dairy households and 500 family members indirectly, the project contributes to Heifer's Milky Way program to transform Nepal's dairy sector. Activities include research on balanced feeding, animal production, greenhouse gas emissions, carbon sequestration from fodder trees, manure and urine management, biogas plant facilitation, and farmer training on good husbandry practices.

Together with project partners, we seek to achieve measurable outputs at the end of the project:

Reduce greenhouse gas emissions from dairy production through the promotion of adapted alternative animal feeding practices while increasing productivity and income of dairy farmers.

Recycle animal waste as a source of green energy and green fertilizer products for local purposes.

Document lessons learned and impact as well as disseminate best climate-smart technologies and practices to small-scale farmers in Nepal (and beyond).

Seedlings of transformation for farmers

Brazil's north-eastern dryland is the world's most populous semiarid region, with many people living below the poverty line. Communities in this area, especially disadvantaged groups, have continued to bear the brunt of the climate crisis, which is impacting their livelihoods and the environment. There is hope for transformation for communities affected by the climate crisis.

In the north-eastern dryland region of Brazil, we partnered with Amigos Do Bem to address climate-induced livelihood challenges. Through this funding support, we distributed cashew seedlings, fertilizers and farming kits to farmers, facilitated training and technical support programs for farmers.

On the heels of a successful first year, we are extending project support through 2025 and are delighted to see the mini-grant program achieve new milestones for the Brazilian people and the planet.



Supporting climate resilience and sustainable food systems

Empowering farmers to adopt regenerative farming practices

AGCO Agriculture Foundation's partnership with The Nature Conservancy (TNC) Brazil builds on our climate resilience program for Brazilian farmers and strengthens strategic initiatives that help them adopt regenerative practices and establish a sustainable, productive landscape.

Through our partnership, we are providing high-value technical assistance to scale adoption of regenerative agricultural practices. This will help farmers improve their farm productivity, restore soil health, build capacity, conserve valuable natural resources and absorb carbon emissions.

Our funding will also establish a demonstration site, form local partnerships, conduct farmer outreach, and create the conditions required to scale an effective program. Implementation activities will focus on two work-streams, targeting farmers and young agricultural professionals.

Stream I

Establish a technological demonstration unit – an "open skies" field lab - Develop a technical assistance hub for students and farmers. This initiative will create technical assistance to farmers, host field days to showcase sustainable practices, and train students and other agricultural professionals.

Stream II

Develop a technical assistance hub for students and farmers. We will create a prototype technical assistance program and test it with 30 farmers, foster agreements with local institutions, partner with private entities, and engage universities to train graduates to provide technical assistance.

Advancing agricultural education and innovation



Championing future leaders in agriculture

The future of agriculture depends on young people, so it is crucial to engage them and support their ideas and innovation. Over the years, our focus on agricultural education, research and innovation has aimed to equip the next generation of agricultural leaders with the essential skills, knowledge and resources needed to make a meaningful impact.

Building on AGCO's long-standing support of the Future Farmers of America (FFA), we expanded our youth program to support Give FFA Day, an annual fundraising event to advance FFA programs. We contributed a matching donation of \$10,000 designated for the FFA Teacher Support Fund, empowering agriculture educators with the tools they need to succeed.

Thanks to friends of the Foundation, we raised an additional \$15,000, for a total contribution of \$25,000 to the FFA Teacher Support Fund.

Farm discovery visits for the next generation of leaders

Country Trust, our local partner in the UK, continues to expand its farm discovery program for children from disadvantaged backgrounds. Our initial funding phase enabled the organization to deliver an additional 70 farm discovery visits for almost 1,800 children.

Furthermore, our support empowered 70 teachers to sustain the impact of farm discovery and trained the Country Trust team on soil health themes, helping the local non-profit maintain its relevance and connection to the soil.

Advancing agricultural education and innovation

Creating opportunities through scholarships

Over the years, we have continued to support young agriculture professionals through tailored scholarship programs and research support, aiming to attract young talent to the agricultural sector.

Our scholarship program with Minorities in Agriculture, Natural Resources and Related Sciences (MANRRS) in the U.S. continues to provide scholarship opportunities to students from underrepresented groups with educational backgrounds in agronomy, agricultural economics, agricultural science, engineering, data science, IT and software development, environmental management and sustainability-related disciplines.

We awarded 20 one-time scholarships of \$1,500 for 10 undergraduate students and \$2,500 each for 10 graduate students. The scholarship program will also continue to contribute to student sponsorships to attend the annual National MANRRS conference as we have done in past years.

Enhancing research, innovation and sustainability

AGCO Agriculture Foundation continues to support Bern University of Applied Sciences' work to develop and advance sustainable farming innovation. Our funding supported student-led research to develop a high-voltage rover for ecofriendly weed control. The rover's wheel module and electric high-voltage pulse generator provide non-chemical weed control in wet climate conditions.

Since its inception, nine students from the bachelor's and master's levels have been involved in the project. Their funded thesis research focused on the equipment's software and hardware components as well as weed and crop databases.

During the late cropping season last year, the Swiss Future Farm hosted a field trial demonstration to assess the progress update of the research project. The trial underscored how the eco-friendly rover technology reduces soil compaction and erosion, operates in various soil conditions, and automates weed control to address soil deterioration.





Strengthening support for farmers and their communities

Supporting farmers: Mental health resources initiative

Farmers around the world face tremendous challenges such as financial pressures of farm operations, mental stress from unpredictable seasons, limited access to health services, and social isolation, among many others. Recognizing these challenges, we are strengthening our farmer-focused interventions to support mental health.

AGCO Agriculture Foundation launched two new partnerships in 2024 to strengthen farmers' mental health and wellness:

In Australia, we committed a grant of AUD 450,000 over the next three years to Rural Aid to enhance its mental health support programs for farmers, including counselling and other resources. Massey Ferguson supplemented the foundation's support by developing communications materials to increase farmers' awareness and engagement with our non-profit partner.

In the U.S. and Canada, we launched a further program with the Do More Agriculture Foundation (DMAF), committing \$150,000 over the next three years. The initiative will connect farmers to mental health resources and strengthen DMAF's impact by building awareness of mental health issues in U.S. and Canadian agriculture communities.



We recognize the distinct pressures that farmers face in their day-to-day work. As a foundation, we are committed to supporting programs aimed at alleviating these pressures and improving mental health for farmers and their families. By funding the mental health initiative in the U.S. and Canada, we hope to ensure that agricultural communities have access to the resources they need to thrive.

Strengthening support for farmers and their communities

Helping communities to rebuild from climate disasters

In 2024, the state of Rio Grande do Sul in Brazil faced devastating floods that disrupted farming activities and displaced families.

Brazil

According to Brazil's State Civil Defence, in May 2024 90% of Rio Grande Sul was devastated by heavy rains. The rain flooded hundreds of cities, displacing families and destroying homes, farms and infrastructure. Canoas was one of the hardest-hit areas, with over 600,000 people displaced.

As part of our flood relief efforts in Canoas, we partnered with Brazil Foundation to establish a \$100,000 donor-advised fund, which received additional voluntary donations of over \$32,000 from AGCO employees. After establishing the fund, we collaborated with a local non-profit organization, Global Communities Brazil, to provide food assistance and mobilize humanitarian emergency response efforts for the communities impacted by the floods.

The intervention included three phases over six months. Phase 1 provided emergency assistance to impacted families. Phase 2 centred on community support, helping to rebuild a local school, as well as a local community organization in Passo Fundo, one of the most flood-affected neighbourhoods. Phase 3 provided vouchers for school and house supplies, delivering home essentials and coordinating legal support efforts.



Receiving the humanitarian and financial support during a moment of fragility is indescribable in terms of how significant this action was in the life of those who received it.

Strengthening support for farmers and their communities



United States of America

In October, Hurricane Helene devastated Georgia's agricultural landscape, wiping out entire fields, destroying timber and damaging farm infrastructure, leaving farmers facing significant financial and emotional challenges. For Georgia's farmers, the impact of Hurricane Helene is more than just economic – it affected their very way of life on the farm.


To support local relief efforts, we provided a donation the 'Weathered But Strong: Hurricane Relief Fund'. Overall, the wider fund raised \$1.7 million to provide immediate support, with 100% of donations directed to Georgia farmers, offering resources to help their recovery efforts and enabling them to continue farming.

World Food Forum flagship event

Over 8,000 attendees gathered at the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) headquarters in Rome, Italy, for the World Food Forum (WFF) Flagship Event in October 2024.

Themed "Good Food for All – Today and Tomorrow," the theme emphasizes the need to improve food systems to ensure they are sustainable, inclusive, and resilient for all, addressing issues like hunger, malnutrition, and climate change.

AGCO Agriculture Foundation gave a keynote on the theme of 'Showcasing the power of agrifood education for young people' where we emphasized the importance of agrifood education in empowering young people to become active participants in transforming food systems.

Furthermore, the event underscored the value of intergenerational dialogue, where young leaders collaborate with experienced professionals to share insights and develop solutions. This approach helps bridge the gap between generations and ensures that diverse perspectives are considered.



Our refreshed strategy, launching in 2025, emphasizes three key themes:


